

### Faith of our Founders... Living Still

n 2024 we will celebrate Trinity's 200th anniversary! Two hundred years ago some of Tallahassee's first pioneers had the vision of forming the church that became Trinity. According to one historian, a group of ten people reportedly gathered in the home of a Mr. Myers on the last Sunday in September 1824 and organized a Methodist Society in Tallahassee. At that time Tallahassee had just been selected as the capital of territorial Florida. It was a wilderness town with few inhabitants and only six houses. The following year the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church established the Tallahassee District and appointed Josiah Evans as pastor of the Tallahassee Mission and presiding elder of the District. Under his leadership the first Methodist church building in Tallahassee was built on what is now the southwest corner of Bronough Street and Park Avenue. From those earliest beginnings, Trinity has been an influential presence in the community.

The opening words of the familiar hymn, "Faith of our fathers, living still" take on new meaning as we look back with gratitude for the founders' faith and commitment, and also as we rejoice in Trinity's growing fellowship and vibrant ministries and anticipate its promising future. Building on these words from this oft-sung hymn, the theme for our year-long Bicentennial celebration will be "Faith of our Founders... living still."

The Bicentennial celebration will kick-off in January with the first of twelve guest clergy, many of them former pastors of Trinity or leaders in the Florida Conference,

preaching on the second Sunday of each month. Special events will involve all ages in learning about the church's history and celebrating its continued presence and impact. Look forward to concerts, social events, a Lay Academy class on Trinity's history, and activities for children and youth. In 1999, Trinity published a book on its history edited by Linda Yates. This book is currently in the process of being updated by Marti Chumbler. Special music composed for the 200th anniversary will be premiered. Then on Sunday, September 29, 2024, exactly 200 years after that initial meeting of the church's founders, we'll join together in a special anniversary service and celebration.

In the coming months, look for signs of the upcoming celebration – a new logo, a webpage devoted to Bicentennial activities and Trinity history, posters, banners, and articles in News & Notes, Tidings, and Crossroads. Perhaps you've noticed some of the work that has been taking place around the church building in preparation for the Bicentennial. More details on these and future updates will be forthcoming.

Trinity's 200th anniversary also coincides with Tallahassee's Bicentennial, so we plan to be part of that observance, as well. Many people are already enthusiastically at work planning events, refurbishing the building, and making special arrangements for what we hope will be a joyous and memorable celebration. We invite you to join the excitement and anticipation as we prepare for this momentous year in the life of our church!

### The Church Through the Years Planning Committee & Historian, Committee


ven though our history states the Methodist congregation built a log cabin church in 1825 at the southwest corner of Bronough and Two Hundred Foot Street (McCarty Street, now known as Park Avenue), there are no known photographs of its semblance. In 1837 three lots were purchased "up the hill" where Trinity has subsequently built three churches on that site.



#### 1840

The Cornerstone of the new church at the corner of Duval Street and McCarty Street (now Park Avenue) was laid in May of 1840. Even though construction was not totally completed, services began at the new church. The 1840 church was a brick building, 40 x 60 feet, with a basement and a gallery. The construction deed required the building to look like the Presbyterian Church of the city. Richard A. Shine, the builder, was paid \$4,250 for his work. Another \$2,500 was paid to John G. Padrick for the roof, windows, gallery, and woodwork inside.

In anticipation of adding a steeple and a bell over the short portico of the 1840 church, a reinforcement project of the area took place in 1858. A two-story parsonage was built next to the church in 1859. With a war imminent, funds for a bell could not be assured. Due to the persistence of the ladies of the church, a bell was obtained in 1875 from a





#### 1893

By June 1892, work had begun on an enlarged and classic new church, being built by Trinity members Foster Clinton Gilmore and George Igdaliah Davis. During construction, Presbyterians opened their church for our services on the second and fourth Sundays. On March 12, 1893, with Bishop O.P. Fitzgerald preaching, the

congregation began worshipping in the elegance of the new church. In 1910, due to the rapid growth of the Church, the same contractors made a Sunday School addition to the north of the original building.

1964

The first service in the sanctuary of the new church was held on May 3, 1964. Bishop Arthur J. Moore (ret.) delivered the sermon. The senior pastor was the Reverend Dr. H. Melton Ware,

and the associate pastor was J.P. Floyd, Jr. Payne H. Midyette, Sr. was the Chairman of the Building Committee. The church was designed by H. Hensel Fink of Philadelphia with Albritton-Williams as the contractor. The gilded stained-glass windows were designed, fabricated, and installed by the Willet Studio of Philadelphia.


The liturgy and processional for the Bicentennial Celebration service, scheduled for Sunday, September 29, 2024, will begin at the site of the first church (the southwest corner of what is now Bronough Street and Park Avenue) with prayer and bagpipe music. The Chancel Choir and Brass will perform "I Was Glad When They Said Unto Me" by C. Hubert H. Parry and "Gloria" by John Rutter. Viktor Billa will close the service with "Finale" from "Symphony for Organ No. 1" by Louis Vierne.

In 2024, as part of our bicentennial year, we intend to have two Orchestra Sundays: March 17th with "Requiem" by Gabriel Fauré and in early to mid December with Beloved Christmas Carols.

## **Explore the History of Trinity and Methodism in Florida**

or those interested in learning more about Trinity's history, check out the book Trinity United Methodist Church: Tallahassee's First Church 1824-1999 available in Trinity's McKenzie Library (287.609 Tri). As part of the church's 175th anniversary celebration in 1999, this book covers the various periods of Trinity's history from its founding through 1999. It was written by Trinity members Norman Booth, Rubie Plant Butterworth, Vernon Parramore, Christine Puckett Moody, and Linda Yates who also served as editor. Marti Chumbler is writing an update of the book that will cover the years from 1999 to the present. It will be available soon after the 200th anniversary celebration in 2024.



Trinity also figures in *Florida Flame*: A History of the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church (287.09759 Tem), an in-depth look at the beginnings and development of Methodism in Florida written by Robert M. Temple, Jr. who grew up in Trinity. Rev. George Foster, a former Trinity pastor, contributed to an earlier book on the history of Methodism in Florida, From Saddlebags to Satellites (287.09759 Bro).

The online catalog of Trinity's adult and children's libraries is searchable online. Look for the Church Library link (https://www.tumct.org/ grow/mckenzie-library/) on the Trinity website under the Community heading. The libraries have books on a broad range of topics, and they can be checked out for 3 weeks. The library is open on Sunday mornings, but church staff can unlock it during the week.
