hat a year we have in store as we reflect on Trinity's presence and witness in downtown Tallahassee for the past 200 years and as we continue to build on that tradition! As I've asked people to consider what Trinity means to them, certain words keep coming up – home, community, family, service, love, commitment, comfort, welcoming, inclusive, worship, music, spiritual growth. They capture so much of the essence of Trinity and are reflected in the plans for this year.

Trinity's outstanding music program has planned many concerts and performances throughout the year. It will kick off the year-long celebration with a concert of Vivaldi's "Four Seasons" on January 9, followed by a concert by St. Olaf Choir on February 2. Three organists from the Tabernacle in Salt Lake City will perform organ concerts on March 9, May 4, and September 21. Trinity Welcomes Rev. Judi New

ith the turn of the calendar into the long-awaited bicentennial year for Trinity United Methodist Church, we begin one aspect of our celebration on January 14, 2024. We welcome the Reverend Judith M. New as our first guest minister of the year in the pulpit on the second Sunday of each month during the year. As with others who will follow her in the coming months and have experienced this revered setting, this will be Judi's first opportunity to stand in the shadows of so many renowned Florida Methodists clergy.

The Reverend New comes to our congregation appreciative of the history of Methodism in Tallahassee and its historical significance to the Florida Conference. Since the spring of 2019, Judi has been the Director and Archivist of the Florida United Methodist Heritage Center and Archives on the Florida Southern College campus in Lakeland. She is an ordained elder in the North Carolina Conference, with her Master of Divinity from Duke University. Additionally, she has her Bachelor of Arts degree from Florida Southern and both her Certificate of Archival Studies and her Master of Library and Informational Sciences from Louisiana State University. She has prepared herself very well to follow in the footsteps of her renowned predecessor Nell Thrift, who was the daughter of Florida Southern President Charles T. Thrift, Jr., and Conference Archivist for 23 years. Judi has worked in many areas of church life as a senior minister, as an associate minister, and as a director of children's ministries. Since high school her parallel interests have been in national and local politics. She is presently preparing to run for a Commission seat in Polk County.

Judi is married to Ed New, an ordained Florida Conference minister. After serving as Associate Pastor at First United Methodist Church, Lakeland for three years, he then served as Director of Advancement at All Saint's Academy in Winter Haven. He is now the President of the Florida United Methodist Foundation. They have three children: Riley (15), Bailey (11), and Shelby (almost 8), who attend public schools in Polk County.

rinity's refugee co-sponsorship team concluded their engagement with our client family from Syria last month. Co-sponsorship is a partnership with the International Rescue Committee in which community organizations are paired with a refugee family to assist with their resettlement and path to self-sufficiency. On the afternoon of December 3rd, our team gathered with our client family for a picnic lunch to spend time together one last time before saying goodbye. After spending over 600 hours guiding, encouraging, and advocating for our family, our time together has come to an end, and we are proud of all the progress our family has made since arriving here in June. They have created a cozy home in their apartment, the children are attending school, and both parents are employed. They are able to have simple conversations in English and have made friends in the community.

Our hearts were heavy as we shared a meal of eggplant, lentils, hummus, halal meatballs, and homemade desserts. We conversed through our mobile translation apps and shared our final sips of hot black tea sweetened with sugar – a treat that we've delighted in with nearly every visit to our client's household. There is a special bond that is formed in the space outside of your comfort zone. There were many places and experiences for our team and for the family that were, honestly, uncomfortable. With frequent exercises of courage and determination, we embraced the discomfort, and a beautiful thing happened. We were equipped by God to navigate the uncomfortable moments together.



Saying goodbye is never easy, but saying goodbye to someone with whom you've shared challenges and navigated adversity is even more difficult. These are experiences through which relationships develop and bonds are formed. We began as two groups of people of different cultures, who spoke different languages and had different life experiences, but we ended as one group of friends. While our hearts are heavy, we walk forward changed. We are changed in the way we understand what it means to love our neighbor and changed in our knowledge of what God can do when we trust Him.

It has been a privilege and a joy to know and serve this beautiful family. Please join us as we continue to pray for our client family as they continue to build their life and their home here in Tallahassee.



Trinity History: Beginnings

The date was January 7, 1826. Tallahassee, the new capital city of territorial Florida, was not yet two years old. Construction was about to begin on the first real capitol building, temporary log cabins having housed earlier meetings of the territory's Legislative Council.

After the cornerstone for the first wing of the permanent capitol was laid near the site of the present State Capitol, Tallahassee's leading citizens proceeded to the Methodist Church for the official cornerstone-laying ceremony. The church, later to become Trinity Methodist Church and then Trinity United Methodist Church, was chosen because it was the only meeting place in the frontier village.

In "The Cornerstone of the Capitol," Mary Lamar Davis describes that early ceremony in the Methodist meeting house. She writes that David B. Macomb, one of Tallahassee's original citizens and later a judge and postmaster, "delivered an appropriate oration, after which the brethren partook of a splendid dinner prepared by C. Pindar" (Charles Pindar, another original resident). Obviously, Trinity's reputation for fine oratory and abundant food goes back to the beginning!

We trace our Trinity history to Methodist circuit riders John J. Triggs and John Slade, sent to territorial Florida by the South Carolina Methodist Conference. In Antebellum Tallahassee, Bertram H. Groene writes that Triggs and Slade gave occasional sermons in the new capital "which probably were the first ever preached in the city." The Conference later sent James Tabor and Isaac Sewell to replace Triggs and Slade.

In 1825, Josiah Evans served as the pastor of the newly formed Methodist society that became Trinity. By that time, it had expanded its ranks and collected resources sufficient to build Tallahassee's first church – described by a later minister as "a small wooden framed house, neither ceiled nor plastered, with no glass in the windows which were closed by solid shutters." That church was at the corner of what is now Park Avenue and Bronough Street, a block from our current home.

As we start this 200th year, we remember Trinity's "Heart for the City" - our unique service to Tallahassee and Florida - which began as early as that original congregation, hosting the cornerstone dedication for Florida's first permanent capitol.
