Bishop Tom Berlin: Bicentennial Sunday Guest Preacher

he Guest Speaker Bicentennial Committee is delighted to announce that Bishop Tom Berlin will be the keynote speaker for our Bicentennial Celebration Sunday on September 29, 2024. This momentous event will commemorate 200 years of the faith, service, and community of Trinity United Methodist Church.

Bishop Berlin, elected as a Bishop of The United Methodist Church on November 2, 2022, by the Southeastern Jurisdiction, has been serving the Florida Episcopal Area since January 1, 2023. His profound leadership and dedication to the church have already made a significant impact in our community.

Tom Berlin's journey in faith began in his hometown of Winchester, Virginia, where he was nurtured at Braddock Street UMC. It was here that he first felt the call to ordained ministry while serving as a summer counselor at the Tennessee Outreach Project (Mountain TOP) mission camp in Ozone, Tennessee. His educational path took

him to Virginia Tech, where he earned a BS in business with a major in public administration, and later to the Candler School of Theology at Emory University, where he received his Master of Divinity. Ordained in 1987, Bishop Berlin started his ministry serving the Brucetown-Welltown UMC Charge and Toms Brook UMC.

Over the years, Bishop Berlin has led churches of various sizes within the Virginia Conference, including 25 years as the Lead Pastor of Floris UMC, a multi-site congregation near the nation's capital. His deep belief in the value of a connectional church and his commitment to its vitality and unity have been hallmarks of his ministry. He has also experienced the power of global connections through partnerships like the one with the Sierra Leone Conference, supporting initiatives such as the Child Reintegration Centre and Mercy Hospital. Additionally, Bishop Berlin is a noted speaker and author, focusing on the Christian life, stewardship, and church leadership.

His leadership extends beyond the local church. He has chaired

the Board of Governors at Wesley Theological Seminary, led delegations to General Conference, and served on the Commission on a Way Forward. As part of the team that created the Protocol of Grace and Reconciliation through Separation, Bishop Berlin has navigated challenging times with hope grounded in the love and resurrection of Christ and the active presence of the Holy Spirit among committed congregations.

Bishop Berlin brought to the Florida Conference much administrative leadership for changing landscape of the conference. downsizing Conference staff, he has been able to ensure smooth transitions for persons nearing retirement, reorganize ministry initiatives and conference organization, which honors the financial commitments of local churches who are in the connection. In addition, he has led the conference to reduce the number of districts and has been creative with the role of District Superintendent, with some of these persons leading ministry areas beyond the district.

Bishop Berlin's relational leadership style is well received by the Florida Conference. He has produced a series of videos entitled "Ask the Bishop" where persons submitted questions regarding the United Methodist Church, Wesleyan Theology, and the Christian Faith. In addition, he has encouraged every church in the Florida Conference to offer a sermon series in 2024 centered on Wesleyan theology and practice, with the goal of our centering in on who we are as Christians and our distinct offering of Christ to the world. His leadership at our Annual Conferences has been spirit filled and inspirational to clergy and laity alike.

On a personal note, Bishop Berlin is married to Karen, and together they have four daughters who have been a significant source of growth and inspiration in his life. He enjoys woodworking, hiking, and spending quality time with his family.

For the Bicentennial Celebration Sunday, Bishop Berlin will deliver inspiring messages at both the 9 AM and 11 AM services

on September 29. Additionally, he will join us for a significant procession from the first church site to our current location at 10:30 AM. This symbolic walk will honor our rich history and the steadfast faith of our congregation through the centuries.

We invite all members and friends of Trinity United Methodist Church to participate in this historic day of celebration, reflection, and unity. Join us as we honor our past, celebrate our present, and look forward to a vibrant future guided by faith and community spirit.

Our own Viktor will pull out all the stops and delight us with a magnificent performance of the famous Finale from Symphony No. 1 by Louis Vierne for the Postlude. Also, prior to the Service, Viktor will play 20-25 minutes of the organ music, which includes the most favorites of our congregation.

The special highlight will be at the very beginning of the Service. After the litany at the location of the first church, bag pipes will lead the procession of clergy and the congregation to the historical Sanctuary with sounds of "Amazing Grace."

The best musicians for the Brass Quintet, Timpani, and double quartet for Chancel Choir will be hired from Florida State University just for this special service. Let's proclaim all these Joyful songs with Love and Grace in Honor of our historical church, which is home to so many children of God.

Opportunity Awaits: Sleep In Heavenly Peace

he words "sleep in heavenly peace" usually stir a feeling of comfort and rest for those who have a comfy bed to sleep in at the end of the day. Think about how much more this means to a child who has been sleeping on a couch or on the floor for much of their life and will now have a comfortable bed to sleep in. This is the mission of "Sleep in Heavenly Peace" (SHP), a national nonprofit organization which has been building beds for children that have no beds since 2012 when it was founded. With a mission statement of "No kid sleeps on the floor in our town", SHP now has over 350 chapters nationwide.



The Opportunity for Trinity United Methodist Church

As part of Trinity's Bicentennial fundraising effort, a commitment was made to allocate 10% (a tithe) of the total amount of gifts to the Bicentennial Campaign during the Fall 2023 Stewardship Drive. This was intended to reflect the missional heart of our congregation and the desire to grow the relationship of the church with the community. After seeking input from our congregation, praying and discussing the ideas presented, the Local Missions Committee voted in June to devote these funds to the sponsorship of a SHP bunk bed build. This ministry would also give the congregation an opportunity to be directly involved with a local mission.

What It Means to Sponsor a SHP Build

Sponsoring a SHP bunk bed build requires three things: funding, a location, and volunteers. As a sponsor, Trinity will provide the funding necessary to build 15 bunk beds. These 15 bunk beds can be assembled as bunk beds or as individual beds, accommodating a total of 30 children. The cost for each bunk bed is \$400 and includes the wood frame, rails, fittings, mattresses, bedding, and pillows.

After consulting with the Tallahassee Chapter of SHP, it was determined that the Trinity UMC parking lots would not be adequate for a build site. The Local Missions Committee considered alternative sites that would provide the space needed for set up and parking for volunteers. Ultimately, the committee selected the Wesley Foundation at FSU as the build site. This site offers the added benefits of building the relationship between FSU/ FAMU Wesley students and Trinity UMC as well as providing a larger source of volunteers. It will take a minimum of 50 volunteers for a 15-bunk bed build, which includes the delivery of the unassembled beds at the end of the build.

A primary goal of local missions is to be the hands and feet of Jesus for those in need in our community. This is an opportunity for members of Trinity UMC to engage in an activity where we are literally using our hands and feet to build beds for children in the community that have no beds. Every bed we build is handcrafted and constructed by volunteers willing to donate their time. The joy that comes from delivering the beds to a child that otherwise does not have one is a life-changing experience.









Due to the popularity and impact of the SHP ministry, the first available build date for Trinity UMC is February 22, 2025. There will be ample notification and opportunities for volunteers to sign up prior to our scheduled date. Read more about SHP at SHPbeds.org.

Lay Academy and the Hortin Years: Decades of 80s and 90s Celebrated the Past With New Beginnings

hat do you do with a sparkling, newly renovated three-story building? Before the paint was dry on Trinity Hall, Long Range Planning Committee II had been named to prepare recommendations. Its report was presented on April 25, 1988, to the church's Administrative Board.

The first planning committee's recommendation that Trinity Hall be refurbished had been accomplished. Now it was time to put its many classrooms to greater use. LRP II said over the next 10 years an expanded ministry of program and Bible study for persons of all ages should be offered in the new facilities and the staff increased to implement them.

David Hortin arrived as new Senior Minister in June 1988 and Rev. Beth Fogle-Miller came as Associate Minister. A new director of Christian education, Linda Mobley, joined the staff also in June. With other staff and church members, she began to plan new educational programs for each age group.

On September 27, 1989, a new tradition of study and fellowship began with something called Lay Academy, a program to include "learning and teaching, sharing and giving, fun and fellowship." On Wednesday afternoons and evenings for eight consecutive weeks, one-hour classes were offered at 4:30 and 6:15 p.m. Dinner in Moor Hall was served at 5:30 to those attending classes as well as to other persons who just wanted to share in the fellowship.

Wednesday also became the time for handbell choir and children's and adult choirs to practice. To take advantage of the Lay Academy setting, programs for elementary children began – first Trinity Troopers and later NETkids.

Rev. Fogle-Miller and DCE Mobley took training to lead another new program – Disciple Bible Study. The 34 weeks of Bible study began as part of the Lay Academy. Also offered were other Bible studies, prayer groups, support groups, exercise, health classes, crafts and hobbies, music, study of

current issues, bridge, Piano 101, and church liturgy and symbols.

A Lay Academy Committee came up with a wide range of offerings in the years that followed. Classes on books of the Bible, gardening and landscaping, defensive driving, stress management, income tax laws, church wide mission studies on Africa and other foreign lands, and computers have been offered, to mention a few. Classes sometimes drew 80 or more people when health issues were presented by local physicians or spiritual issues were discussed by a group of current and retired professors of religion at FSU.

A new Director of Christian Education replaced Linda Mobley in October 1993. Barbara Doak, now Barbara Hynes, continued the successful Wednesday Lay Academy programs.

NETkids and other children's and youth programs attracted more and more young families to the after-school activities at Trinity. Youth groups had annual mission projects in Appalachia, and adults went on mission trips to Mexico and to help build Habitat houses in Brazil. Here at home, a team from the church took part in the Tallahassee Habitat for Humanity's Thanksgiving Blitz building of three houses. Trinity continued to work with other UM churches in building additional Habitat houses each year.

Dr. Hortin invited leaders of the religious community to plan an interfaith Thanksgiving service each year of his 11-year ministry at Trinity. When the Florida Annual Conference adopted a Vision 2000 plan by which to strengthen United Methodist Churches by the year 2000, Dr. Hortin and the Administrative Board appointed a committee to prepare Trinity's own plan. The committee presented its Vision 2000 mission statement to the congregation in January 1993 and presented priority goals later that year. At that time membership totaled 2,058.

The church celebrated two important events during Dr. Hortin's ministry. On Feb. 5, 1995, the 150th anniversary of the founding of the Florida Conference of the Methodist church was celebrated at Trinity, the place where the Conference first met. Dr. Hortin named the 175th anniversary committee that made plans to celebrate in September 1999, the anniversary of Trinity's 1824 organization. He retired in June 1999, three months before the event and a new minister, Rev. John Willis, presided at the gala occasion.

The reflective nature of the service allows people to ask questions and to find the answers for themselves within Scripture, music, and relationships. The Prayer Station has been a crucial part of the service, indicating a physical space where prayer and action come together in people's faith.

Rev. Dr. Robert Gibbs to Preach on September 8

rinity is blessed with many retired pastors as part of our congregation, one of whom is our former District Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Robert "Bob" Gibbs. The son and grandson of United Methodist pastors, Bob Gibbs grew up in parsonages across the state. With that heritage, it's not surprising that he might follow in his father's and grandfather's paths to ministry, but he took some detours before going down that path.

At Florida Southern College, where he earned a BA in history, Bob was very interested in political science and a career in government. He spent a semester in Washington at American University and considered going to law school following his graduation.

But wait, Bob's life took quite a different turn when he served as a counselor at Warren Willis Camp and joined up with two other counselors, Waite Willis and Angelo Fuster, to form a folk group called Rainbeaux. They got an agent and went on the road to perform at restaurants, clubs, college campuses, and churches for several years. According to Bob, the three albums that they recorded are now "major collector's items."

It was during a stint in Ohio where the group sang in hotel lounges, that Bob realized that God was calling him in another direction. He enrolled in Emory's Candler School of Theology, earning a Master of Divinity degree and later earned a Doctor of Ministry degree from United Theological Seminary.

Bob returned to Florida and initially served as pastor at First UMC, Ocala, as an Associate Pastor, followed by pastorates at John Wesley UMC in Tallahassee, First UMC, Miami,

Englewood UMC, First UMC, Lakeland, and St. Andrew's UMC, Brandon. He had a deep interest in campus ministry and for five years served as the Methodist campus minister at the University of Central Florida, Rollins College, and Valencia Community College. Later Bob was appointed as District Superintendent of the North West District, which includes Tallahassee. He served on several Conference and District committees, including the Board of Ministry and the Board

of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, which he chaired.

Bob has been active in social justice work both during his career and in retirement. While serving churches in Miami and Lakeland, he became involved with the local affiliates of the Direct Action & Research Training Center (DART), an organization that coordinates congregation-based community organizing programs that mobilize people to work for justice. Inspired by the successes that they had in addressing serious local problems, he has been one of the leaders of Trinity's involvement in the Capital Area Justice Ministry (CAJM), a DART affiliate, and serves on CAJM's Affordable Housing Research Group.

Following his retirement in 2016, Bob and his wife, Brenda, settled in Tallahassee. Brenda is a gifted actress who has performed locally at Theatre Tallahassee. They have two children, Dr. Beth Gibbs, Director of Choral Activities at Florida Southern College, and Rob (McCoy) Gibbs, a professional musician in Nashville, Tennessee.

On Sunday, September 8, Bob will be our guest clergy, preaching at the 9:45 and 11:00 services.
