BFC Ministry Prepares for the New Year

Are You Thinking about Fitness Goals for the New Year?

It's hard to believe December is here, and the Christmas season is upon us! This means there will be gatherings with friends and family at all kinds of holiday celebrations and events. But December is also a time where many of us reflect on the past year and start thinking about making New Year's resolutions—which often include some type of fitness or exercise goals.

As you think about your health goals, the BFC (Becoming Fit at Church) Ministry Instructor Team invites you to consider trying one of the great fitness opportunities right here at Trinity. What makes this ministry different than going to a gym or taking an exercise elsewhere? Our goal is to have fun, fellowship, get fit, AND raise funds for community service. Since our instructors volunteer their time, one hundred percent of daytime class donations received from participants go directly to community service locally and globally. A very small portion of evening donations may be used to replenish equipment, but most go to special causes too. Since the BFC Ministry began in 2008, over \$85,000 has been raised through participants' donations.

There are five weekly daytime exercise classes offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays for adults of all ages and abilities. Our classes are non-intimidating, and our instructors are trained to modify exercises so everyone can participate. Pickleball is offered on Thursday evenings, and in January, a short three-week clinic will also be offered for those who have never played but would like to learn how.

You can even register for events that require sign-ups right there on the app! You can download the app in three easy steps:

- 3. Click the TUMCT icon to download the app onto your phone.

To create an account, click the person icon in the top right-hand corner. Then click "Log in or sign up" and fill in your profile information. You're all set! Enjoy the app!



Rev. John Willis Jr.: A Heart for the City

Rev. John Willis to Preach at all three servics at Trinity on Decmeber 8

n baseball, a pitcher who specializes in finishing a winning game is called the CLOSER. It is entirely fitting that Rev. John Willis is the CLOSER, delivering the last sermon of Trinity's bicentennial year on December 8. Indeed, John was Trinity's senior pastor in 2004 for the 180th anniversary, arriving for the celebration on that Sunday in September attired as a horse-mounted, old-time circuit rider.

Since 1824, our church has survived and thrived, without interruption, many a challenging time from early colonial days, through the Civil War, economic depression, two world wars, and "Jim Crow" segregation. Reverend Willis is but one of a long legacy of strong pastoral leaders, who along with dedicated worshipers, have kept Trinity at the center of Tallahassee's faith community. That tradition continues as Trinity begins its third century of service to God through Jesus Christ.

After graduating as an Army second lieutenant and receiving his paratrooper airborne badge, John was assigned to combat duty in Vietnam in command of a unit of sentry dogs guarding an ammunition dump. Later he graduated from Emory's Candler School of Theology. Before arriving in Tallahassee, John, with his wife Pat, served as associate and later as senior pastor at several churches in the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Their first years at Trinity could be best described as tumultuous and challenging. John had hardly finished his very first Sunday sermon in June 1999 when workers showed up the next day to begin preparations for the new organ. For the next six-plus months, the sanctuary was filled with scaffolding, drop cloths, sawhorses, and construction equipment as work proceeded with installation of the organ's massive pipes. Left with only one pulpit, John ignored the mess and delivered the usual Sunday morning worship services.

The very next year in December, the George W. Bush v. Al Gore presidential battle was being fought just down the street at the Florida Supreme Court. TV trucks and news organizations world-wide had descended upon our previously peaceful city, filling all hotels and restaurants and leaving no place for parking.



Despite the tumult all around, John forged ahead in ministry. His "Church With a Heart for the City" initiative was well underway. It included the Kate Sullivan Elementary School mentors' initiative and outreach projects to Providence Community, an underserved neighborhood south of town. John and Pat revived and strengthened Trinity's longstanding faith compact with San Pablo Methodist church in Fomento. Cuba. It was the rebirth of a

relationship which had been essentially outlawed by Castro's 1959 revolution and still remains an important part of Trinity's mission. Another initiative was the Capital Faith Forum, which started in 2001. Each week, a community leader spoke in Trinity's Sanctuary about the role that faith played in their lives and careers, and a lunch in Moor Hall followed.

Right before the initial Capital Faith Forum, the 9/11 terrorist attack struck. Trinity became a major source of comfort and prayer for all of our American brothers and sisters. Trinity's Sanctuary became the downtown venue for those seeking solace and comfort from the pulpit. Many from all walks of life attended those weekly services, which included prominent speakers and musicians.

Even after retirement, John has continued to provide leadership to the laity, spearheading the Hope Community project to improve living conditions for homeless families with small children. As Trinity starts its third century of service, it remains Tallahassee's "Church with a heart for the City." John's and Pat's continued presence at Trinity is a source of comfort for the future.

We will welcome Rev. John Willis at all three services on Sunday, December 8, as our CLOSER, the final guest clergy of 2024's

Money Matters: A Call for Help

uccess for the Trinity United Methodist Stewardship Season is the most important path for our church community to move Onward into our next 200 years. What is at stake? Everything—our pastors and staff, all programs, music, missions, children, young adult and adult ministries—all reliant on budget funding.

What is the goal?

We need \$1.6 million in pledges to adequately fund Trinity's existing programs. As of November 26, 2024, we have collected \$1,060,159.00 from 184 pledges, totaling 64.64% of our goal.

Pledges are the best way for Trinity to responsibly plan its budget. Although our church membership includes 1,037 adults available to pledge, a majority of our members give as they can by year end. That system is difficult. We are approximately \$80,000 behind in collections for 2024.

How can you help?

- 1) GIVE your gift by year end 2024 to help Trinity finish 2024 in the black.
- 2) PLEDGE for 2025—either online, by ACH (automatic deduction), by mail, or by calling the church office at 850-222-1120.

Doesn't Trinity have plenty of money based on its recent renovations and Bicentennial plans?

NO, all funds for renovations and Bicentennial activities were gifts to the church, completely separate from the operations budget. Those renovations are now complete and the bills are paid.

How much time is there to fix our budget problems?

Our church fiscal year is January to December. Responsible budgeting and effective church operations encourage us to respond within that time frame. Trinity United Methodist Church has successfully met operational challenges for 200 years. In 2025, we hope to once again begin a visioning process to identify priorities, goals and objectives for the next 5-7 years.




The Results Are In!
