#### **Celebration Sunday Parking**

Parking is available and awaiting your arrival on January 12, 2025. Celebration Sunday will be a very busy day. Officers and volunteer greeters will be located throughout the property to greet you and direct you to convenient parking.



After dropping off passengers at the front of the Trinity Sanctuary, all church attendees can park as usual, for as long as those spaces are available. Additional spaces will be available with on-street parking and in the Jurors' Parking Lot, immediately west of the library parking, just across Bronough Street. It can be accessed by going west on Tennessee Street and turning left on Bronough. The Jurors' Parking Lot is on the right, a two-minute walk to the sanctuary.

ALL musicians, staff, and volunteers will park at Kleman Plaza. Van transportation will be available from the fountain/planter at Kleman on College Avenue to transport everyone parking there for the short ride to the sanctuary. If you choose to walk to the sanctuary from the Kleman Plaza fountain/planter, the distance is one-tenth of a mile, less than a three-minute walk.

#### Still ahead...

In February, we look forward to the special Bicentennial Mission Project, Sleep in Heavenly Peace, building bunk beds for children in our community who have no bed in their home. We will also provide them with bedding and pillows. This project was funded during bicentennial fundraising, when 10% (a tithe) of the total amount of gifts to the Bicentennial Campaign were set aside to benefit the community. **In March**, our in-house author, Marti Chumbler, will have the updated history of Trinity completed, including the Bicentennial Celebration information. # The Dr. Wayne Wiatt Years at Trinity

#### Dr. Wiatt was Trinity's lead pastor from 2016 to 2022.

ith Wayne C u r r y 's retirement in 2016, Trinity's new pastor was introduced to the congregation as Wayne 2.0. Rev. Dr. Wayne Wiatt came to Trinity after serving churches in Jacksonville and Palm Coast, as District Superintendent of the East Central District, and as Director of the Office of Clergy Excellence,



where he had responsibility for the care and oversight for all licensed and ordained clergy in the Florida Conference.

In his first few years at Trinity, Wayne introduced the congregation to Zoe Empowers, an African-based ministry that empowers orphaned youth to become healthy, safe, and self-sufficient. Several individuals from Trinity visited Kenya to see the Zoe empowerment model in action and returned with a commitment to support one of the youth-led families. Closer to home, Trinity also committed to the Capital Area Justice Ministry (CAJM) as one of its founding members. Inspired by the vision of Trinity member Leah Wiley, CAJM is a coalition of religious congregations working together to bring about justice and equity in Tallahassee and the surrounding area.

Wayne faced several major challenges during his time at Trinity. In 2020, the COVID-19 Pandemic struck the US, and public places, including churches, were shuttered for a while. At a time when there was great uncertainty about the best way to deal with a pandemic and people were largely isolated at home, it was even more important for the church to offer stability, comfort, and hope. Wayne recalls that the staff didn't miss a beat in responding to this challenge. Organist Viktor Billa and Communications Director Spencer Schrowang experimented with ways to record Sunday services and make them available online. Initially Wayne preached to an empty sanctuary, Viktor played the organ, and the recordings were spliced together, creating services that could be viewed on Facebook. A gift from Dr. Orson and Eleanor Smith enabled the church to purchase equipment that greatly enhanced the audio and video quality, and the services were quickly livestreamed on YouTube. Church meetings, Lay Academy, Sunday School, and exercise classes shifted to the online platform Zoom, and there were creative efforts to continue the work of the church.

The pandemic took a toll, though, on church participation and membership. Some people got out of the habit of attending church and never returned. Others objected to the Conference's mask mandate designed to keep people safe and expressed their displeasure in vitriolic letters and hostility directed toward the pastor.

In part due to the pandemic's effect on the church finances, Wayne took a dual position as District Superintendent of the Florida Conference's North West District, while also serving as Senior Pastor of Trinity. The additional funds from the Conference helped to cover some staff salaries.

Another reason for Wayne's decision to simultaneously serve as District Superintendent involved the ongoing struggle within the United Methodist Church (UMC) over the issues of ordination of gay pastors and allowing pastors to perform same-sex weddings. With individuals and churches threatening to leave the denomination, Wayne was "bound and determined to lead the way in unification rather than division." Despite his efforts to keep churches within the UMC, there were some that voted to disaffiliate. Again, the target of anger and hostility, Wayne recently noted with satisfaction that even in those areas where churches left the denomination, new UMC churches have sprung up.

It was during Wayne's tenure that planning for the church's bicentennial celebration began. He tapped Dr. Lynn McLarty to lead the initial planning. Lynn, he said, had a vision and kept the focus and momentum going, even during the pandemic. In 2021, a permanent historical marker detailing the church's 1824 beginnings was placed in front of the church, effectively launching the bicentennial Many individuals



stepped up to make gifts for renovations to the church as it prepared for its 200th anniversary celebration.

Wayne retired from Trinity in 2022 but continued as District Superintendent for one more year. His successor at Trinity, Rev. Dr. Matthew Williams, arrived in time to be involved in planning for the bicentennial celebration and for helping to shape the year's events.

Sunday School classes have traditionally connected Trinity worshippers with one another, and while their names, locations, and even schedules have changed over time, these small groups remain a vibrant element of Christian education at Trinity. Please check out our Sunday School classes below:

#### 8:30 a.m. | Library | Young Adult Class

Welcome to our early riser class! Members gather for coffee, conversations, and the study God's Word.

#### 9:45 a.m. | Room 301 | Agape

The Agape class focuses on sharing selfless, encouraging, and unconditional love. This class includes many parents who are raising children. Newcomers are always welcome.

#### 9:45 a.m. | Room 305 | Aldersgate

The Aldersgate class welcomes everyone who desires discussions and learning together. This January they will begin the study *Praising the God of Grace: The Theology of Charles Wesley's Hymns*.

#### 9:45 a.m. | Room 307 | Betty Phifer Advanced Studies Class

This full-hour class examines multiple themes from a Christian perspective. Their January study is *Moral Man and Immoral Society* by Christian theologian Reinhold Niebuhr. This book was among the most influential Protestant social and political writings of the 20th century.

#### 9:45 a.m. | Groom's Room | Just Us Gals

This group meets weekly for conversations, support, Christian therapy, and love as they share laughter, tears, and advice about every subject and the challenges each member is experiencing.

#### 9:45 a.m. | Conference Room | Adult Wesley Bible Study

This class continues the Adult Bible Studies' *Following Jesus*. They are currently studying Unit 2, which looks at the New Testament to explore "Jesus' Beloved Community."

#### 11:00 a.m. | Room 305 | Son Servants

This class desires to grow closer to God and one another through Bible study and outreach ministries. They welcome new members!

While these groups meet on Sunday mornings for Bible study and discussion, the bonds they form often lead them to find other opportunities for fellowship. For example, members of the Son Servants class, pictured right, recently formed a team at the Gingerbread House Contest on Wednesday, December 4.

Many Sunday School classes get together for holiday parties, dinners, and other types of celebrations throughout the year. Being a part of a Sunday School class at Trinity offers every participant the opportunity to gain a sense of community, love, and support among a small group of dedicated believers.

# More Than a Birthday: A Blessing for the **Aristondo Family**

s the soft glow of candlelight danced upon the faces of Paola and Angelica Aristondo, it was hard not to feel a sense of joy and wonder. The twin sisters, elegantly dressed as movie characters Elsa and Anna, were celebrating their first birthday. Their celebration was more than just a personal one; it was a testament to the blessing of community and the universal nature of God's love.

A small group of volunteers from our congregation has had the privilege of partnering with a team from Saint Paul's United Methodist Church to journey alongside the Aristondo family. The Aristondos are refugees from Guatemala, seeking a new beginning and a brighter future here in our community. Their journey, marked by both challenges and triumphs, has been a poignant reminder of the interconnectedness of humanity and the global church.



It was an honor to be invited to celebrate the family milestone together on this special day. Our volunteers have built personal relationships with the family members while assisting them on their path to self-sufficiency. Trinity has provided critical support, with our volunteers walking alongside the Aristondos on their resettlement journey. Our team has strived to fill in the gaps and offer practical help by purchasing a mattress, paying an over-due utility bill, and most significantly, assisting with employment search. We've been continually humbled by the family's unwavering faith and resilience, as well as their gratitude and gentle spirit.

As the twins blew out their candles, it was as if they were blowing away the darkness of the past and embracing the promise of a new beginning. Riding home with a hand-crafted Frozen centerpiece in my lap (a kind memento from the insistent host), I reflected on our interactions with the family over the last several months.



The Aristondos are faithful Christians; they faithfully served at their home church in Guatemala. They thank God for our outreach, and I see our relationship as a testament to God's faithfulness and the power of the global church to reach out and provide hope to those in need. Paola and Angelica may have been okay without our intervention. Their family's limited case management support and government stipend may have been just enough to set them on a positive trajectory, but we got to be the church for them. We got be the instruments of God's love.

It has been a remarkable privilege to be part of that eternal work. May we all, as members of the Body of Christ, continue to extend our love and support to those around us who are in need, recognizing that we are all part of one universal family.



# **Trinity Youth Happenings**


