Sleep in Heavenly Peace Bed Build

The wheels are in motion for Trinity's February 22 bunk bed build.

• e would like to say thank you to the 87 members of our congregation, family members, and friends who responded to our "show of interest" for the Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) bunk bed build that Trinity United Methodist Church is sponsoring. As a result of the overwhelming show of interest, we are now ready to begin the official sign-up for the build.

You will still need to sign up to participate even though you responded to the "show of interest." Scan the QR code on the right and click on the SignUpGenius link. Once you've opened the SignUpGenius page, scroll down, and you will note that there are four categories for volunteer assignments. If you decide to be a "Build Team" member and a "Delivery Team" member, please sign up for both slots. Please remember that children under the age of 12 are asked to be supervised by a parent/guardian at all times.



What if I want to help but can't be a part of the build?

If you can't be a part of the build, there are other ways to help! We are going to kick off our journey to the February 22 build with the opportunity to donate bedding (for twin beds), which will be delivered with the 20 bunk beds that we have committed to build. The bedding includes; sheets, pillow covers, pillows, blankets, bedspreads, or comforters. All donations must be new. (Mattresses for the beds are provided by SHP.) Collection bins will be present in the Narthex and in the Welcome Center from Sunday, January 26, through Sunday, February 9.

What should I expect on the day of the build?

- A typical build day begins at 8:00 a.m. and ends by noon.
- Water, sports drinks, and snacks will be provided.
- All materials, tools, equipment, and personal protective gear are supplied by SHP, who will be on site for the build.
- No experience is needed—the build follows SHP's simple and easy-to-follow bunk bed design and requires no previous woodworking experience.
- Inexperienced volunteers are trained and supervised by experienced staff from SHP.
- Volunteers will be measuring, drilling, sanding, staining, sorting hardware into Ziplock bags, partially assembling bed frames, and branding the headboard.
- Delivery team volunteers will deliver and assemble the beds at the recipients' home.



For General information about SHP, you can visit SHPbeds.org If you plan to sign up for the Delivery Team, there is a tutorial for how to assemble the bunk beds once they are delivered to the recipient's home. Trinity and the Civil Rights Struggle


Editor's note: In recognition of Black History Month, we share this overview of the January 2025 issue of *Crossroads*, a quarterly publication of Trinity's Historical Society. This edition is entitled "Special Issue on the Civil Rights Movement: Trinity and the Struggle for Civil Rights." n his sermon on Celebration Sunday, Bishop Tom Berlin recalled asking Dr. Williams what Trinity had done during the Civil Rights movement. The same question had occurred to me a few years ago since there didn't seem to be much written about that period in the church's history. I set out to see what I could learn, which led me to interviewing church members, or in some cases their children, who were here in the 1950s and 1960s, checking historical church documents, and reading other sources that detailed Tallahassee's Civil Rights struggle and changes within the Methodist church nationally.

Looking back from the vantage point of sixty to seventy years, it's difficult to realize that there was a time when Black people couldn't worship at Trinity or become members, but that was indeed the case for most of the twentieth century. It wasn't until 1970 that the first Black people since the Civil War and Reconstruction joined Trinity as members. In the meantime, people left the church because it wouldn't seat Black people, while others left when some Black people were seated a few years later. Some members of the congregation tried to preserve the status quo of Jim Crow segregation, while others had the courage to stand up for justice. The words and actions of these courageous individuals helped move the church to become more open, welcoming, and inclusive, as well as having an impact on the community. Through the leadership of pastors and forward-looking members of the congregation, the church navigated those difficult times and ultimately remained faithful to Christian beliefs that all people are children of God and equal in God's sight.

To know ourselves, we need to know and confront our history and consider what we're doing in the present. We, too, face challenges and societal change. Despite progress that has been made, racism and injustice are still present. People, including those who are unhoused, members of the LGBTQ+ community, and immigrants, are still marginalized. How will we respond? Perhaps we can learn from this time in our church's past to guide us in the present. In the words of Bishop Berlin, "Don't forget to remember."
